Trip Report

Day 1: Sunday, 10th May 2023 ~ Nairobi

Arrival day, everyone gathered at the hotel - no significant birding took place (except for tour leader Leon Marais' visit to Nairobi National Park; birds seen on the 10th are from this outing, just to show what can be seen there).

Day 2: Monday, 11th May 2026 ~ Nairobi to Samburu

The day started with an early breakfast followed by departure for Samburu. Nairobi traffic bogged us down for a while, but at least we were going against the main flow, and were soon making good progress towards our destination. We stopped for lunch in Nanyuki, getting to grips with a few of the more common bird species as well, before pushing on to Archer's Post and then Samburu National Reserve. Here the birding got underway in earnest, and we recorded species such as Somali Ostrich, Yellow-necked Spurfowl; White-bellied Go-away-bird, Kori Bustard, Black-faced Sandgrouse, Grey Crowned Crane, Lilac-breasted Roller, White-throated Bee-eater and many more on the way to the camp. We stayed at Elephant Bedroom, a charming tented camp along the Ewaso Ngiro River, which was flowing quite strongly after thunderstorms in the main catchment area. We arrived in the late afternoon and had some time to settle into our accommodation before a wonderful dinner on the deck and a chance to get to know each other a little bit.

Day 3: Tuesday, 12th May 2026 ~ Samburu National Reserve

The day started with coffee delivered to the rooms before a sunrise departure on a half-day exploration of the reserve. We hit Samburu at its prime – conditions were perfect and the birds were making the most of it. Indeed, we've never seen so many 'bush birds' before! Chestnut Weavers and Chestnut Sparrows were breeding in huge numbers and literally every tree was festooned with active nests. Added to these were other species such as White-browed and Donaldson-Smith's Sparrow Weavers, Swahili and Kenya Sparrows, Black-capped Social Weavers and others to make for staggering numbers of small passerines, all in full breeding mode. Other notable species seen included Vulturine Guinea-fowl, one of the Samburu classics, Yellow-necked Spurfowl, Somali Ostrich, Kori, White-bellied and Buff-crested Bustards, Black-faced Sandgrouse, Gabar Goshawk (normal and dark morphs), Martial Eagle, Verreaux's Eagle Owl, White-headed and Blue-naped Mousebirds, Northern Red-Billed, Eastern Yellow-billed, African Grey and Von der Decken's Hornbills, Red-and-Yellow and D'Arnaud's Barbets, Rosy-patched Bush Shrike, Red-bellied Parrot and many more to make for a terrific half-day of birding. We had some great mammal sightings as well, including the 'Samburu Specials': Reticulated Giraffe (wow!), Gerenuk, Grevy's Zebra, Beisa Oryx and Desert Warthog; plenty of Elephants and the highlight: a mating pair of Leopards up close. After a picnic breakfast (which was later than planned due to all the action!) we meandered back to camp for lunch and a siesta. We then had an afternoon drive under epic skies, with large thunderstorms on the horizon all around us to end the day. Back at camp we had time to freshen up before dinner, with a large Crocodile occupying the breakfast area, much to the amusement of the camp guests (it was shooed away by staff members the next morning so that breakfast could be served).

Day 4: Wednesday, 13th May 2026 ~ Samburu to Ol Pejeta

Today we had a leisurely breakfast in camp before packing and departing for Ol Pejeta. Our route took us back to Nanyuki and past Mount Kenya and we arrived at Sweetwaters Camp in time for lunch (with a great view of a pair of Black Rhinos just before entering the camp gates) and a bit of time to settle into our rooms before an afternoon drive on the conservancy under dramatic skies. We saw loads of African Buffalos (including two big bulls having a bit of a rumble; an impressive sight indeed); Elephants, Lions (distant, they were quite far off the road), a variety of antelope species, a stunning pair of Grey Crowned Cranes; and other species such as White-bellied Go-Away Bird, Yellow-billed and Marabou Storks, Rüppell's and Superb Starlings, Grey-capped Social Weaver, Red-collared and Jackson's Widowbirds and Purple Grenadier, among others, and ended off with a terrific sighting of a female Black Rhino with tiny calf in tow. Back at camp we had time to freshen up before dinner and bed, with what seemed like the whole county's worth of Egyptian Geese having arrived at the camp waterhole to roost for the night.

Day 5: Thursday, 14th May 2026 ~ Ol Pejeta to Lake Nakuru

We started off with an early drive, heading out to the open plains in the west of the conservancy, with spectacular views of Mount Kenya in the distance to the east on a beautiful, sunny morning. Highlights included a crash of White Rhinos (these being Southern White Rhinos; Ol Pejeta is also home to the last two remaining Northern White Rhinos, which are kept in a secure enclosure). Back at camp we had breakfast and then departed for Lake Nakuru. Our route took us back to Nanyuki and past the Aberdare's, through the 'onion town' – a town that's main industry seems to be the purveying of red onions along the roadside (and you can certainly smell it), with a lunch stop near Thompson's Falls (where we had our only sighting of Hartlaub's Turaco) before continuing through the central Kenya highlands and on to Lake Nakuru National Park, where we were staying at Sarova Lion Hill resort. We arrived in the late afternoon for some time to freshen up before dinner. Birds seen on the day included Shelly's Francolin, Kori and White-bellied Bustards, Great White and Pink-backed Pelicans, Tawny and African Fish Eagles, Augur Buzzard, Meyer's Parrot, Grey-backed Fiscal, Rufous Chatterer, Arrow-marked and Black-lored Babblers, Anteater Chat, Golden-winged Sunbird, Red-cheeked Cordon-bleu, Yellow-throated Longclaw and many others.

Day 6: Friday, 15th May 2026 ~ Lake Nakuru to Lake Baringo

The day started before sunrise with an early breakfast at the resort, followed by packing and departure for a drive around in the park. As with all of the Rift Valley lakes, water levels are rising alarmingly, and in places the lake shore was now lapping at the road around the lake edge (and the causeway road, which we'd done previously, is now completely flooded). We had a great morning under clear blue skies, with the emerald colour of the grass and yellow-stemmed Fever Trees adding to the pleasure of being out and about in nature. We managed to see several of the Rothschild's / Nubian Giraffes, these animals having been part of an introduction program from the western parts of the country by the Kenyan government in the 1970's to secure a breeding population of this endangered species, which is recognizable by the white 'socks' and fifth 'horn' or *ossicone* on the heads of the males. Other species seen included Southern White Rhino, Olive Baboon, Thompson's and Grant's Gazelles, Plains Zebra, African Buffalo and birds such as Long-tailed Widowbird in spectacular breeding plumage, Little Rock Thrush, Abyssinian Wheatear, Hildebrandt's Spurfowl, Malachite and Pied Kingfishers, White-fronted and Cinnamon-chested bee-eaters and of course large numbers of water-associated species such as Herons, Egrets, Ibises, Spoonbill, Pelicans etc.

From Lake Nakuru we made our way to Lake Baringo, arriving at the edge of the lake in the late afternoon for a ferry-ride to the camp (even just a few weeks prior one could reach the lodge by car). We checked in and had some time in the rooms, enjoying great views over Lake Baringo before dinner.

Day 7: Saturday 16th May 2026 ~ Lake Baringo

We started the day off with some coffee in the main dining area before boarding the boat for an extended birding session with local birding guide Titus Kangor. It was a fun morning, with loads of great birds seen, including Gull-billed Tern, African Darter, Little Bittern, Black-crowned Night Heron, Squacco Heron, Purple Heron, Hamerkop, Western Osprey, African Fish Eagle (with three staged swooping-down-for-fish photo opportunities), Jackson's Hornbill (frequents the feeder at the lodge), Woodland, Malachite, Giant and Pied Kingfishers, Olive Bee-eater and many more. Back on shore we had breakfast and then attempted a birding walk, but the heat got the better of us so we retired to our rooms before lunch and then had an afternoon birding session with Titus that produced Sledar-tailed Nightjar, Spotted Thick-knee, Heuglin's / Three-banded Courser, Pearl-spotted Owlet, Spotted Eagle Owl (or even possibly Greyish Eagle Owl – we saw two birds at the known Greyish Eagle Owl stakeout, but could only see the eyes of one, which were amber-coloured, not dark as with Greyish, but not lighter yellow as with Spotted either. Perhaps an intermediate form), Fan-tailed Raven and Bristle-crowned Starling, among others. All in all, a spectacular end to a spectacular day at Lake Baringo. Back at the lodge we had some time to freshen up before dinner.

Day 8: Sunday, 17th May 2026 ~ Lake Baringo to Kakamega Forest

Today we started with an early breakfast before catching the boat back to the shore where our vehicle was parked, and from there making our way out of the Rift Valley (with a drink stop on the edge of the western wall where we were entertained by Fan-tailed Ravens interacting with Pied Crows and an Augur Buzzard) and on to Eldoret, where we bought drinks for our stay at Rondo Retreat (Rondo only serves soft drinks, so for the beer / wine / gin drinkers it's B.Y.O) and had our picnic lunch in a random car park adjacent to a building that just happened to have what were probably the best toilets in the whole town. From there we carried on to Kakamega Forest and Rondo Retreat, arriving just as the regular afternoon rainstorm hit. Umbrellas were issued and we checked into our cottage before having tea and cake on the porch, joined by a small group of Joyful Greenbuls which had eyes on the cake. We then rested up a bit while the rain came down until dinner time.

Day 9: Monday, 18th May 2026 ~ Kakamega Forest

We started the day with an early breakfast, followed by departure with Patrick, the local guide, on a full morning exploration of the forest. Conditions were stunning after the rain the previous evening and the birds were out in force. Highlights included Great Blue Turaco, Blue Malkoha, African Pygmy Kingfisher, Buff-

spotted and Yellow-crested Woodpeckers, Brown-throated Wattle-eye, Bocage's and Lühder's Bush Shrikes, African Blue Flycatcher, White-chinned Prinia, Turner's Eremomela, Brown-chested Alethe, Green-headed Sunbird, Blue-spotted Wood Dove and many more. It was a busy morning indeed – forest birding can be tiring, looking up into the canopy high above, hunting for birds in the thick understory, trying to get views through the foliage.... By late morning we needed a break so headed back to the retreat for some coffee and more relaxed garden birding. We then had some lunch and, in the afternoon, attempted a walk in the grounds but at exactly 15h00 it started to rain, so we gave that up and took the afternoon off, seeing what we could see from the porch with tea and cake at hand – not a bad way to while away the time, and we'd had such a good morning we didn't feel like we were missing out. And besides, we still had another full day ahead of us. Later in the evening we met up for a wonderful dinner before another peaceful night at Rondo Retreat.

Days 10: Tuesday, 19th May 2026 ~ Kakamega Forest

The schedule was the same today as it was the day before – early coffee delivered to the rooms followed by a full morning birding excursion. The birds were a lot quieter today though, and we struggled with many of the target species, one of which was the stunning Blue-headed Bee-eater, a species that is mainly restricted to Central and Western Africa, but with a remnant population here in Kakamega Forest. Initial attempts were fruitless, and it took a great sighting of a troop of Black-and-White Colobus Monkeys to lift the spirits a bit (though we were still having a great time!). Patrick, our local guide, then decided that we should try another part of the forest, near the forestry service headquarters and bang! – just behind the buildings we found three Blue-headed Bee-eaters, getting some great views and they hawked insects from perches along the forest edge. After that it was time to go back to the retreat for coffee and a break (and some time watching the resident Crowned Eagle fledgling hopping around in the gardens), followed by lunch and an afternoon walk in the forest around the retreat (the afternoon rain held off, fortunately). Birds seen for the day included White-headed Wood Hoopoe, Grey-throated, Yellow-spotted and Yellow-billed Barbets, Chestnut and Jameson's Wattle-eyes, African Shrike-flycatcher, Mackinnon's Shrike, Dusky Tit, a range of Greenbul, Chubb's Cisticola, Black-collared and Buff-throated Apalises, Banded Prinia, Black-faced Rufous Warbler, Scaly-breasted Illadopsis, Blue-shouldered Robin Chat and more. We also managed to have afternoon tea and cake on the lawn for the first time, as the previous two afternoons had been quite wet. Another pleasant dinner ensued and soon we retired to our rooms for a good night's sleep.

Day 11: Wednesday, 20th May 2026 ~ Kakamega Forest to Kisumu

Today we had a relaxed morning, some doing a bit of birding in the grounds (we saw a female White-spotted Flufftail!), others just relaxing in and around the rooms, happy to enjoy the stunning venue for a few hours with not much to do. After breakfast we departed for Kisumu, arriving in time to check in and grab some lunch before heading down to Hippo Point for our appointment with local guide Titus (a different Titus to the one at Lake Baringo) and the boat captain for our cruise out on the lake. Unfortunately, our main target, Papyrus Gonolek, refused to show, but we had a good afternoon anyway, seeing the usual assortment of water-associated birds as well as species such as Golden-backed Weaver, Double-toothed Barbet, Red-chested Sunbird, Swamp Flycatcher and Eastern Grey Plantain-eater. Back at the hotel some of us met up for drinks at the rooftop bar, with views over the skyline and lake in the background as the sun set before dinner and bed.

Day 12: Thursday, 21st May 2026 ~ Kisumu to Mara Triangle

With a long road trip ahead of us we had an early breakfast and departure for the Mara Triangle. This part of Kenya is well populated, so we passed through town after town until the buildings and general humanity started thinning out as we got closer to the reserve. Excitement mounted as we descended the Ololooloo escarpment and entered the Mara Triangle Conservancy. We did some game viewing and birding as we made our way to Mara Serena resort to check in and grab some lunch before an afternoon safari. We took a drive out to the Hippo pool in the Mara River, which was busy with Hippo's of course, all getting active ahead of sundown. Other species seen included Elephant, Olive Baboon, Masai Giraffe, Spotted Hyena and a variety of

plain game species, while in terms of birds we recorded Common Ostrich, Helmeted Guineafowl, Red-necked Spurfowl, Black-bellied Bustard, White-browed and Black Coucals, African Openbill, Rufous-bellied Heron, African Harrier Hawk, Long-crested Eagle, Grey-headed and Brown-hooded Kingfishers, Sooty Chat, Grey Crowned Crane and many more. At sunset we made our way back to the lodge in time to freshen up before dinner ahead of a full day in the Mara Triangle to come.

Day 13: Friday, 22nd May 2026 ~ Mara Triangle

An exciting day dawned as we met up for coffee in the main building before heading out into the reserve for a full morning of birding and game viewing. The plains were alive with game, even though this isn't migration season, with large numbers of various species – Buffalo, Eland, Zebra, Topi, Grant's and Thompson's Gazelles, Masai Giraffe etc – dotting almost every view. We had a great Leopard sighting as a highlight: a female on the prowl, keeping an eye on a herd of Thompson's Gazelles, though no actual hunt took place that we saw. Plenty of other animals and birds were seen and we headed back to the lodge for lunch and a rest before an afternoon safari, which produced a good Lion sighting and some epic afternoon landscapes under dramatic skies, with lighting flashing in the distance at sunset as we got back in time to freshen up before dinner.

Some notes on the Mara Triangle vs. Masai Mara National Reserve below:

The first stop 'in the Mara' was in fact the Mara Triangle Conservancy, which is not part of the Masai Mara National Reserve. The Mara Triangle is a separate entity, with totally different management to that in the National Reserve. The Triangle falls on the western side of the Mara River and is bounded by the Oloololo Escarpment to the west, and the Tanzanian border to the south. There are pros and cons in terms of the two parts of the Mara (not including the many conservancies on the northern side). The Mara Triangle is better managed, no doubt. The roads are better, and there's far more control of off-road driving and 'bad behaviour' by local guides. But the accommodation is more limited, and Mara Serena is the best option, even though it's bigger and more 'hotel like' than what we would like. But it's well situated, offers great views, and good food and service. The Masai Mara National Reserve on the other hand has many more accommodation options, including small, exclusive camps such as Basecamp Mara. But the roads can be a mess after rain, and there's little control of off roading, and the guiding ethics by some local guides can be questionable (which is not such an issue in the quiet season but can be a big turn-off during the busy periods, such as when the Wildebeest migration is on). However, the National Reserve has apparently appointed the Mara Triangle management to work on the roads (a big job!), so the main roads at least are in a reasonable state, but the bush tracks can be quite a challenge after rain. So, the ideal is to include both parts of the Mara, to enjoy the advantages of each.

Day 14: Saturday, 23rd May 2026 ~ Masai Mara

Today we had an early breakfast before departing for our final stop, Mara Base Camp in the National Reserve. Game spotting in the Mara often relies on seeing other vehicles stopped and the occupants looking at something and then either approaching or avoiding, whichever your preference! We did a bit of both, but on this morning decided to approach and found a Lioness and several cubs lying in the grass a short distance off the road. But not far away, less than 50 meters, were a couple of other vehicles which we assumed were watching more Lions, but were in fact watching a Cheetah, who obviously wasn't aware of the Lions and vice versa. When the Lions started to move the Cheetah got wind of them and made a hasty retreat, with clusters of Antelope and several Giraffes on the hillside overlooking the scene, not quite sure which cats to keep an eye on. We then had a coffee stop at a picnic site before continuing on to Mara Base Camp. Not far from the lodge we noted herds of Antelope staring down into the dip beyond, out of which appeared a single Lioness on the move, passing right behind us to disappear into thicket where we surmised that she had some cubs stashed, awaiting nursing. Once we'd checked into camp, we had lunch and some time to relax before an afternoon safari, this time with the cats eluding us (though we did see a cluster of cars off in the bush, but in

this case chose to avoid the scene). Under dramatic skies we headed back to camp for time to get ready for dinner and our final full day on the safari.

Day 15: Sunday, 24th May 2026 ~ Masai Mara

The last full day of the safari.... Once again, we met up early for coffee and departed at sunrise for a full morning safari. First up, besides the general game, were some Lions, including a mating pair, followed by a wonderful packed breakfast stop under a tree and then a lone male Cheetah not far from the lodge on the way back. There was plenty else to be seen of course, not the least of which were the stunning landscapes of the Masai Mara. Back at camp we had some time to relax before lunch (and again after lunch) and for the afternoon some of us went out on a final afternoon safari (some took more time to relax in camp). But it was a good move to go out, as the solitary Cheetah we'd seen in the morning caught a Thompson's Gazelle just across the river from the camp. We didn't see the kill, but watched him feeding, with a Black-backed Jackal and what appeared to be a Tawny Eagle fighting for scraps, and a flock of Helmeted Guineafowls prancing around on the periphery, clearly perturbed by the predators (more the Eagle than the Jackal or Cheetah). Soon a couple of Spotted Hyenas appeared on the scene. The first one trotted by quite close to the feeding Cheetah but never caught on to the scent of the kill, but the second one did, and soon appropriated the main piece – though the Cheetah had had his fill and moved off, coming right past our vehicle. All in all, an exciting end to the wildlife viewing! Back at camp we had a lovely final dinner before the homeward journey began the next day (though Brian and Elspeth still had several weeks left in Kenya, fortunately for them!).

Day 16: Monday, 25th May 2026 ~ Departure

Today would begin in relaxed fashion, with a lie-in (or birding from the porches) followed by breakfast and a mid-morning slow drive to Ol Kiombo airstrip for our flight to Wilson Airport in Nairobi, where we had a chance to say goodbye to each other before going on to our respective hotels.

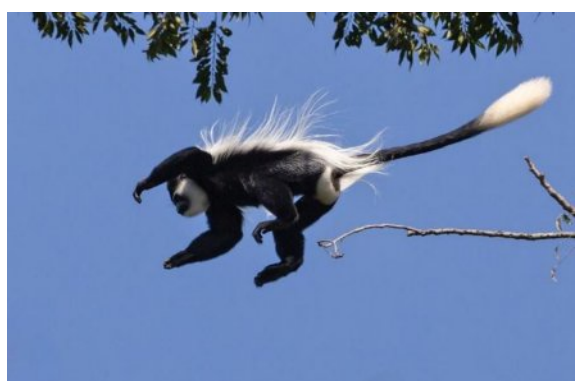
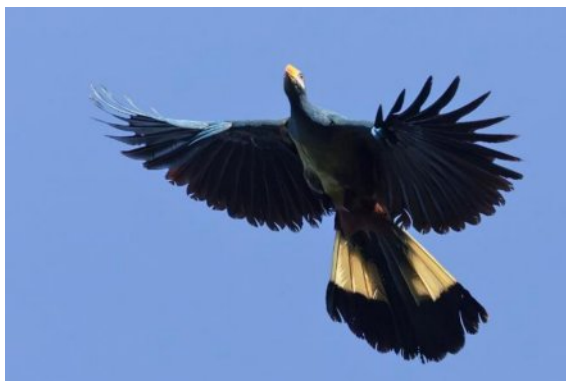

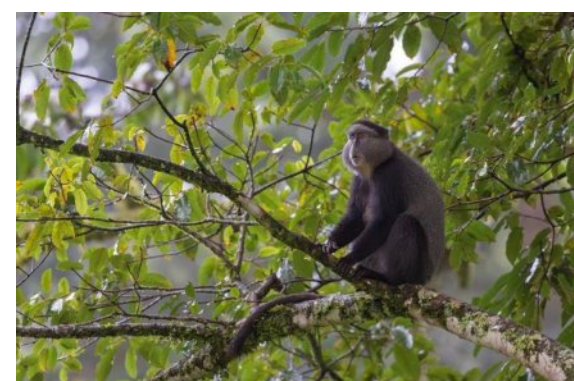
